## Goal of the Workshop – The development of a team approach to caring for the whole person

The workshop will train Christian health providers and pastoral caregivers in how to provide emotional and spiritual care for sick persons and to integrate this with medical care in the same clinical setting.

## Objectives of the Workshop

1. Describe the inadequacy of the bio-medical model that focuses primarily on physical aspects of disease and not on the whole person
2. Contrast this with examples of healing the whole person and how we can do the same
3. Describe the scientific and spiritual basis for wholeness of the person
4. Outline the basic components of the mind and personality
5. List common affective problems and explain their negative influence on health and healing
6. Describe resources available through faith for emotional and physical healing and for health maintenance
7. Outline an approach to spiritual assessment and care
8. Outline approaches to caring for persons who have chronic pain, cancer, are aging, face an imminent death, or have a chronic physical or emotional illness
9. Describe the caring relationship with a sick person
10. Describe how to train lay counselors as members of the care giving team

## Who should attend?

The workshop is designed for Christian health providers and pastoral caregivers, lay or professional, who wish to integrate in one clinical setting care for physical, emotional, and spiritual concerns of sick people. The focus is on entry-level psychological care and triage.

## Workshop Facilitators

**Dan Fountain**, MD, MPH served as a medical missionary in the D.R. Congo for 35 years as a surgeon, educator, and community health leader. He pioneered an approach to whole person care in a church hospital in the Congo. He is known globally for his work in church-related health ministries. He has served as an associate of MAP International and from 1996-2001 as a consultant to Southwestern Medical Clinic in Michigan where he adapted the whole person care model to a US health care setting. He is an assistant professor at King College and director of the Global Health Training program. He has written books in English and French on community health, primary health care, and care for the whole person.

**William Morehouse**, MD is a family physician working in association with His Branches and Elim Bible Institute at Grace Family Medicine in Rochester, NY. He has been practicing whole person medicine since 1978 and has served on short-term missions in Lebanon and Peru.

## The importance of a team approach to whole person care:

God made us as whole persons, with body, soul, and spirit. Illness affects the whole person, and care for the whole person is essential for complete healing and restoration to wholeness. This workshop will show Christian health professionals and pastoral caregivers in practice situations domestically and internationally how to combine medical, psychosocial, and spiritual care within a clinical setting.

Many sick persons have personal, emotional, or family concerns that impact their health or response to illness. Most of them do not need, or cannot afford, professional counseling but can benefit greatly from primary-level emotional and spiritual care and support. Health providers often do not have sufficient time or training for this. With trained caregivers in the office, however, care for mind, soul, and spirit can be integrated with medical care.

## Workshop Locations

The workshop will be held on Thursday and Friday at Elim Bible Institute in Lima, NY. On Saturday morning it will be combined with a Christian Physician Breakfast at the University of Rochester, finishing later in the day at His Branches, 350 Arnett Boulevard in Rochester, NY.

## Schedule

Registration is at 8:00 am on January 20. The workshop goes from 8:30 am to 4:30 pm on Thursday and Friday and 8:00 am to 5:00 pm on Saturday. Participants may register for a portion of the workshop by special arrangement.

## Sponsors
